

Students studying flexihoricalture in the School of Poundation Studies and Skills for Life have benefited from the development the most. The course is suited for disabled people and students with learning difficulties.

Horticulture lecturer John Attoe said: "It's famiastic. They give students the chance to guin employability skills and teach them what the real world is actually like."

The students are a major contributor to Norwich in Broom. As well as giving thewer to various places around Norwich, they picked up the Siver Gift medal last year at the Norwich and Norfolk Horticultural Society event at the Royal Norfolk Show. And they are delighted with their new workshon.

18 year-old Darren Webster said: "It's brilliant - we didn't have a lot of room before. We're here to make people happy and thut's wine this has done."

Daniel Shopphard, 17, commented: "We want to make Norwich a more colourful plans so it's more appealing." The two groothouses are





roughly 25 metres long and are filled with blooming flowers of every colour. With an outdoor work space and a shed too, the new facilities are impressive.

The development was mostly government funded. A grant was given with initiatives to

develop employability skills for students who have learning difficulties or who are disabled.

Norwich blooms with sustainable growing media

In January 2014 and 2015 Finents of Norwich in Moon received 814,300 to coordinate growing projects as part of the SHP scheme (see box bolow). Volunteers worked in partnership with City College Norwich, Moreido FLV Souncil and local facilities company, Norwich Norse to cultivate sustainably grown personals for rose plantages across the city.

The group increased the sustainability of its displays by replacing much at its. bi-annual bedding with a selection of perceivals and dinatal. Some isomerical displays were strained in key oracs. This is a partnership of people with the knowledge and expertise to grow from seed and plug plants to be passed over to City College Norwich students to nurture to maturity.

As well as receiving donations such as seeds from seed breeding company Floranova, trays and compost from Notcutts, business help through sponsorship of signage on roundabouts and other locations.






